# History

OF AMELIA EARHART

Forward Worthington's Community Image Committee wants to erect a statue in Worthington as a visual reminder of Amelia Earhart's time in Worthington and her rise to international fame.

Earhart spent her summers in Worthington between 1907-11 as a friend of the Mann family. She befriended their pony, Prince, and learned to ride him bareback. She also learned to milk cows, put up hay, and help around the farm. She loved swimming and fishing in Lake Okabena.

Amelia took her first airplane ride Dec. 28, 1920, in California. She was hooked on flying after her first lesson Jan. 3, 1921, and became noticed for her skill and fearless determination. She set numerous flight records, was the first female to fly across the Atlantic as a passenger, and was the first woman to fly solo.

Amelia's dream was to fly around the world. She took flight in June 1937, but weather issues and radio problems over the South Pacific led to a loss of contact. Some believe she was held prisoner on an island occupied by the Japanese.

She has gained international fame and we are happy and proud to say Worthington played a part in her life. Historically speaking the Community Image Committee of the Worthington Chamber of Commerce, feels a statue is a visual reminder about times past.
